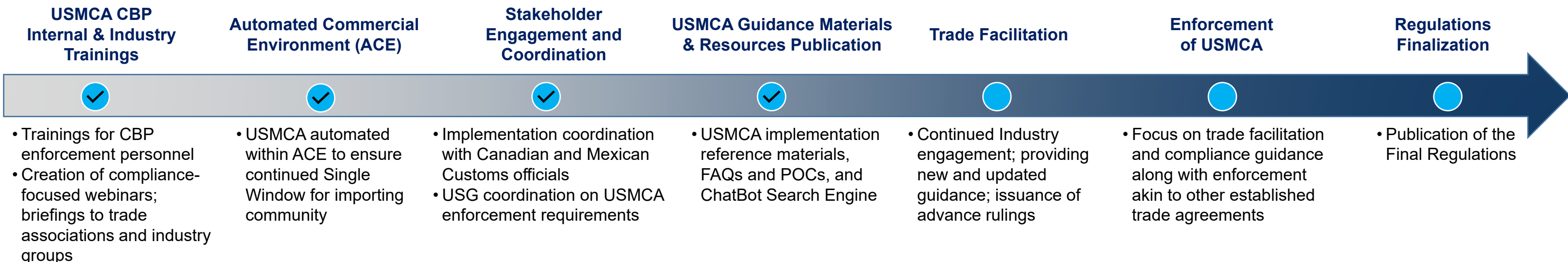
Ensuring a Comprehensive Implementation of the USMCA

United States – Mexico – Canada Agreement (USMCA)

USMCA is a trade agreement between the named partner countries and replaces the 25-year-old North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). USMCA preserves NAFTA's trilateral trade pact and provides updates to reflect developments in technology and trade practices. CBP is the lead for implementing the USMCA's Rules of Origin and other preferential treatment requirements.

Frequently Asked Question

Q: Does the USMCA have a required Certificate of Origin (COO)?

A: Unlike NAFTA, the USMCA does not require a specific Certificate of Origin form. A certification of origin is valid so long as it has the nine required data elements and is provided upon request to CBP. A suggested template is available at CBP.gov.
